Vaccination against whooping cough and flu in pregnancy is safe and protects against serious illness in pregnant women and their babies in the first few months of their life. However, for some communities, including Māori and Pacific communities, work is needed to improve the number of women being vaccinated in pregnancy.

Our study aims to develop tools and resources to increase vaccination of Māori and Pacific women in pregnancy.
