Te Manawa Taki

The name of our region, Te Manawa Taki, means the heartbeat and represents our position as the heart of Aotearoa New Zealand. Stretching coast to coast and covering from Coromandel in the north to Turangi in the south Te Manawa Taki covers 56,728 km area.


There are around 61,870 under 4-year-olds in Te Manawa Taki with 37% Māori, 14% Asian and 3% Pacific. Overall, Te Manawa Taki has the largest Māori population compared to any other region in Aotearoa at 28%, this region is also expected to have the largest Māori population growth forecast.

Te Manawa Taki's unique geography and population requires an approach that is regionally supported and locally driven.

This plan draws on the findings from the Re-Imaging Immunisation Report and represents the richness of our provider network including general practice, National Public Health Service and Hauora Māori Providers.

Included in the plan are:

- 1) Alignment to the Te Manawa Taki Regional Immunisation Plan
- 2) System Level Measure Improvement Activities and contributory measures
- 3) PHO baseline and milestone



Alignment to Regional Immunisation Plan

The Regional Immunisation Plan is led by the National Public Health Service and focuses on ensuring that immunisation services are more efficient, equitable, and tailored to the local population's needs. The key initiatives in the wider plan include:

Co-design approaches with tāngata whaikaha





Establishing local immunisation groups

NPHS establish local provider networks to collaborate and lift childhood immunisation.



Implement community engagement and health promotion.





Strengthen hospital-based immunisations

Establish processes for inpatient and outpatient delivering of immunisations.



Increase vaccinator workforce

Increasing availability of vaccinator training, streamlining the vaccinator authorisation and enabling pharmacy project.



Including Well Child Tamariki Ora, midwifery services, pharmacy services and public health nurses.

Improvement Plan

This SLM Improvement Plan focuses on the significant contribution of Primary Health Organisations and General Practice in providing childhood immunisations. This plan feeds into the wider Regional Immunisation Plan and focuses on six improvement areas. PHOs will take a localised approach to implementing the improvement activities as they respond to local need.

LOCAL COLLABORATIVES



NPHS lead local efforts to boost immunisation rates through local collaboratives. PHOs will actively engage in local collaborative efforts to lift immunisation uptake within priority populations.

STRENGTHEN DATA INTEGRITY

PHOs participate in national AIR reconciliation work programme with AIR team to support reconciliation of AIR and PMS data.

CULTURALLY SAFE ENVIRONMENT

PRO-EQUITY ENROLMENT

PHOs will collaborate to implement place-based, pro-equity enrolment services that align with Outreach Immunisation Services (OIS), prioritising Māori, Pacific, hapū māmā, and their pēpē.



LOCAL COLLABORATIVES

NPHS lead local efforts to boost immunisation rates through local collaboratives. PHOs will actively engage in local collaborative efforts to lift immunisation uptake within priority populations. Examples of activities include:

- Providing data and insights to support planned outreach events
- Participation in events organised through local collaboratives
 - Continue to build close relationships with Hauora Māori and Pacific Partners
- Develop processes for issues raised at local collaboratives to be escalated to leadership

Immunisation rates by milestone age (6, 8, 12, 18 and 24 months)



Immunisation rates by ethnicity (Māori, Pacific, Asian, and other)

Immunisation rates by deprivation quintile (1-5 and unknown)

End of year goal: Milestone 1 target reached



CULTURALLY SAFE ENVIRONMENT

PHOs will work towards creating culturally safe and encouraging environments for immunisations, including robust anti-racism frameworks and cultural safety training. Examples of activities include:

- Education to frontline staff on pro-equity responsive engagement
- Taking services to whanau using community nurses and community workers
 - Provision of Te Reo and Te Tiriti o Waitangi education to network staff
 Ensure easy to read, bilingual information on immunisations is readily available to practices


PHO Relative Rates Immunisation of fully immunised 24-month-olds between non-Māori and Māori.


PHOs participate in national AIR reconciliation work programme with AIR team to support reconciliation of AIR and PMS data. Examples of activities include:

Proportion of practices that have addressed resolvable data reconciliation issues





ENHANCE PRECALL/RECALL

PHOs will support General Practices in reviewing and optimising their precall/recall processes. This includes providing training to address perceived barriers to accessing immunisations (e.g. non-enrolment with a practice, outstanding debt not being a barrier). Examples of activities include:

Establish practice champions to support immunisation efforts

Clinical leadership groups to ensure best practice precall/recall methods are understood

Quality improvement programmes aimed at lifting childhood immunisations are in place with practices

Provide Practice level dashboards linked to prioritised taget lists


Proportion of practice that have reviewed precall/recall processes

End of year goal: 100% of practices have reviewed precall/recall processes.



HESITANCY AND MISINFORMATION

PHOs will implement approaches to understanding and addressing vaccine hesitancy and misinformation impacting immunisation rates. Examples of activities include:



Upskilling internal staff on understanding the drivers of vaccine hesitancy and misinformation

Learning from frontline staff on the barriers they encounter when discussing immunisations

Contributing measure



Percentage of eligible children or parents who have declined immunisation at any milestone

End of year goal: Reduction in percentages of declines.

PRO-EQUITY ENROLMENT



PHOs will collaborate to implement place-based, pro-equity enrolment services that align with Outreach Immunisation Services (OIS), prioritising Māori, Pacific, hapū māmā, and their pēpē. Example of activites include:

Work directly with maternity services to streamline newborn enrolment

Kaiawhina support for pro-equity enrolment

Outreach support for whānau to complete enrolment forms

Number of individuals enrolled through place-based pro-equity enrolment services

End of year goal: Pro-equity enrolment services availabe in all local areas
